Dear Ms. Sadtler:

On behalf of the Chesapeake Conservancy, thank you for the opportunity to respond to the Proposed Special Order By Consent for Violations at Virginia True Golf Course, promulgated by the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). While we appreciate DEQ's investigation of the repeated violations that have occurred in conjunction with this project, we believe the proposed consent order falls short in three key areas: an insufficient civil assessment, no requirement to replant trees that were uprooted and burned during the illegal clearing, and no plan to require an undisturbed forested setback to prevent future collapses of the adjacent high bluffs known as Fones Cliffs.

As we pointed out in a June 2018 letter to DEQ Director David Paylor, Fones Cliffs is a nationally significant feature along the Rappahannock River. In its *Conservation Strategy for the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail* (Trail), the National Park Service (NPS) identifies Fones Cliffs as a "high potential historic site" and specifically as a "significant voyage stop in a setting that is highly evocative of the 17th century." It was August 1608 when the Rappahannock Tribe first encountered John Smith at Fones Cliffs, and the interaction is vividly captured in Smith's journal. In 2016, researchers from St. Mary's College of Maryland documented Fones Cliffs and its environs as part of the Indigenous Cultural Landscape of the Rappahannock Tribe, who received Federal recognition in 2018.

The mission of the Chesapeake Conservancy is directly aligned with promoting and defending the Trail, especially those iconic locations like Fones Cliffs that NPS has identified as being especially important in telling the story of early North American explorers and the tribes they encountered.

The fact that archeological resources were present on the property was made part of the public record when it was proposed for a conservation easement by Virginia Outdoors Foundation in October 2013. In January 2018, soon after the illegal clearing was discovered, the Chesapeake Conservancy publicly implored Virginia True Corporation to allow access for archeological investigations before any further damage could occur. That request was ignored.

The potential loss of undocumented archeological resources from the illegal clearing and subsequent earth moving to install stormwater controls is devastating to those who seek to understand the culture of American Indian tribes at the time of the earliest European settlements into what would become the United States.

While protecting cultural and historic resources is not a statutory responsibility of DEQ or the State Water Control Board, the fact that Virginia True Corporation was well aware of undocumented archeological resources at this site, and chose to uproot trees and clear over 13 acres to bare ground without consulting regulatory authorities, should be factored into DEQ's response.

Fones Cliffs are well known and well documented as a concentration area for bald eagles, where the resident breeding population is joined by migratory eagles from across the entire length of the Atlantic Flyway. The Cliffs are part of the Lower Rappahannock Important Bird Area, designated as "globally important" by the National Audubon Society. The Rappahannock River itself is a treasure of the Commonwealth, being the longest free-flowing river in the Eastern United States. Rappahannock River Valley National Wildlife Refuge was established in 1996 in recognition of the tidal Rappahannock's importance to bald eagles, wintering waterfowl, migratory songbirds, and the habitats on which they depend. Fones Cliffs is identified in the refuge's *Land Protection Plan* as being among the highest priorities for conservation.

There is no question that Fones Cliffs and the Rappahannock River are atypical for the concentration of natural and cultural resources they harbor. The Virginia True Corporation, despite repeatedly being made aware of these values, and publicly promising to protect and celebrate them, demonstrated a willful disregard for state law by illegally clearing over 13 acres in this sensitive area. Accordingly, we find that the proposed civil payment of \$42,000 to be inadequate and not commensurate with the significant losses of natural and cultural resources resulting from the unpermitted activities of the Virginia True Corporation. For an entity that has embarked, albeit illegally, on a project reported to cost hundreds of millions of dollars, a \$42,000 fine can simply be chalked up to the cost of doing business. Their slow reaction to the initial warning letter from DEQ and the "stop work" order from Richmond County, resulting in two subsequent notices of violation from DEQ, attests to the company's initial *laissez faire* attitude.

In addition to our deep concern about the loss of wildlife habitat and archeological resources, we remain concerned about the massive amount of non-point-source pollution that has entered, and continues to enter, the Rappahannock River and its adjoining wetlands. When describing non-point-source pollution in the Chesapeake Bay, the DEQ website states, "By volume, sediment is the greatest pollutant of all."¹ Since the illegal clearing at Fones Cliffs began approximately nine months ago, tons of sediment have eroded into the river and wetland ravines. Because the remedial actions required by DEQ and Richmond County have yet to be completed, sediment continues to wash into the river.

Even more disturbing to those who care about the health and vitality of the Rappahannock River, the Proposed Consent Order under consideration by DEQ does not take into account the massive sloughing off of the cliff face that occurred after the second notice of violation was issued to Virginia True. We are told that DEQ could not determine a direct causation between the illegal clearing (and incomplete remediation) and the sloughing off of trees and sediment from the top of the cliffs and the cliff face that occurred in May 2018 after significant rain events over the Northern Neck.

We have reviewed many photographs, including historical photos from previous cliff failures that we believe provide clear evidence that clearing trees near the edge of the cliff top results in increased water flow, loosening of the porous diatomaceous soil, and cliff failure. This in turn results in tons of sediment washing into the river at a time when Chesapeake Conservancy, state and local governments, and conservation partners from across the Chesapeake Bay watershed are developing and implementing plans to reduce sediments and nutrients from entering the Bay.

In terms of remediation, we are concerned that the Proposed Consent Order does not require Virginia True Corporation to replant trees that were illegally uprooted and burned. This previously forested area extending landward from the top of the cliffs not only provided optimal bald eagle habitat, but acted to dampen the eroding effects of heavy rainstorms like those that have pummeled the Northern Neck this summer. Virginia True's engineer publicly stated his opinion that no engineered stormwater controls would have prevented the erosion from the illegally cleared area that was observed due to the heavy rains of May 2018. However, other portions of Fones Cliffs that were not disturbed did not experience the cliff failures such as that seen immediately adjacent to the cleared area.


Accordingly, we strongly recommend that Virginia True Corporation be required to plant trees across the entire cleared area to reduce erosion resulting from heavy rain events which are surely to happen again and again. By allowing them to plant grass instead of trees, DEQ is allowing the Virginia True Corporation to gain traction on one of its ultimate goals, which is an unobstructed view of the river from the planned hotel, condos, and golf course. This statement is based on Virginia True's preliminary plans and sketches, since no final development plan has been submitted.

Our final concern is about the future of this sensitive area. We have reviewed the report prepared for the Virginia True Corporation by the Virginia Shoreline Erosion Advisory Service, a program within the Department of Conservation and Recreation. Among other recommendations, the report calls for establishment and maintenance of an undisturbed vegetated buffer landward from the cliff edge that extends twice the height of the cliff. The height of the cliff where the illegal clearing occurred is approximately 140 feet, thereby requiring a 280-foot undisturbed buffer. This buffer would create positive impacts in three meaningful ways: preventing erosion into the Rappahannock River, maintaining prime bald eagle habitat, and protecting archeological resources such that they can be studied and documented.

In addition to our comments above, we are attaching 467 signers of an online petition that we circulated to our many supporters who share our concerns about water quality in the Rappahannock River and protecting the extraordinary natural and cultural resources of Fones Cliffs.

Thank you again for the opportunity to comment. We look forward to your response and are willing to testify publicly if the opportunity is presented.

Speak Up for the Eagles at Fones Cliffs! Join Us in Asking Virginia DEQ to Hold Violators Responsible for Cliff Degradation

Signers of this petition join Chesapeake Conservancy, Chesapeake Bay Foundation, Essex County Countryside Alliance, Friends of the Rappahannock, Northern Neck Audubon Society, Preservation Virginia, Rappahannock Indian Tribe, Rappahannock Wildlife Refuge Friends, and Scenic Virginia to demand action by the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). We call on DEQ to hold the violators accountable for degradation occurring at Fones Cliffs along the Rappahannock River in Richmond County, Virginia.

Following the illegal clearing of 13 acres in the fall of 2017, and two significant rain events along the Northern Neck in May 2018, massive amounts of cliff face adjacent to the cleared area sloughed off, sending entire trees and tons of sediment to the bottom of the cliff and into the Rappahannock River. Fones Cliffs is a national treasure. It is ...

- an iconic feature of the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail;
- a globally significant Important Bird Area for both resident and migratory bald eagles and other migratory birds;
- the ancestral territory of the Rappahannock Tribe, and remains largely un-surveyed for archeological resources which are disappearing before they are discovered and documented.

DEQ has previously issued two notices of violation for illegal clearing of trees and other vegetation, and slow response in remediation at Fones Cliffs. Now, **DEQ must:**

- **Require the violator to rapidly complete installation of storm water and erosion control measures;**
- **Require the violator to remediate damaged areas, including replacement of trees illegally uprooted months ago;**
- **Levy significant fines upon the violator to send a strong message that further skirting of environmental regulations will not be tolerated;**
- **Work with Richmond County to require permanent protection and maintenance of forested buffers extending landward from the cliff edge sufficient to minimize further major sloughing of the cliff face, at least a 2:1 ratio of cliff height to buffer width; and**
- **Work with the Rappahannock Tribe, the Virginia Department of Historic Resources, and researchers to require the violator to conduct archeological surveys in areas proposed for clearing and that hold a high probability of containing archeological resources.**
